9. REVIEW OF THE MONTHLY REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

Syosset High School Student Government representative Carly Battipaglia provided an update on recent extra-curricular activities at the High School including the blood drive, and the carnival that raised approximately \$23,000 for student activities. She also gave updates on Spirit Week, student committee activities, High School Fall athletics and a student mural project.

- The district's independent external auditor gave a report on the district financial statements for the 2015-2016 school year. She described the district's fiscal controls as "very good" with "no material weaknesses."
- PTA Council President Stephanie Avidon and other PTA officers provided each board member with a gift for School Board Recognition Week, in appreciation for their service and dedication to the students of Syosset. Board members thanked the Council and community for its support and confidence in the Board.
- Coordinator for Educational Services Peggy Grosso provided follow-up information on a Board request of the district's food service provider to post ingredients of all its meals online as a precaution for students with food allergies. The company said that due to its different partnerships with various food vendors that often change, this was not feasible. Grosso said that while competing food service providers post expanded online interactive menu listings, they do not provide a comprehensive list of ingredients. Superintendent of Schools Dr. Thomas Rogers said the district would consider writing a new Request for Proposal that would require food service providers hoping for work with Syosset to provide menu information online.
- Dr. Rogers updated the community on the cost of a series of facilities projects outlined at the September Board meeting. Based on new economies realized from some overlapping work and identifying additional work that can be performed by district maintenance staff in-house, the Administration was able to reduce the cost by approximately \$3.5 million from what was originally estimated.
- Dr. Rogers also discussed a recent meeting he had with the PTA Cultural Unity Committee in which administration agreed to improve translation services for parents with minimal English language comprehension.
- Following a meeting with members of the New York State Board of Regents, Dr. Rogers reported that the state appears open to reexamining its scale-scoring practice for the Regents Math exams, as other school districts have also expressed their concerns with the current system.
- On November 8, the district will conduct a joint superintendent conference/professional development day with the Jericho School District. This "Ed Camp" format, requires participants to develop workshops that will be conducted on both district campuses.
- Dr. Rogers provided a recap of a September 29 community forum on the possibility of changing the high school start time. Approximately 60 residents attended the forum and were presented with medical research on sleep deprivation and melatonin development in adolescents, social research on how home environments affect sleep, as well as logistical and financial challenges of transportation schedule changes associated with a time change and how this would affect other schools in the district. The subject of homework volume and how it impacts the amount of sleep students receive became a focus and Dr. Rogers said he would review feedback from the attendees and conduct additional research on the homework issue.

10. REPORT FROM THE SPOKESPERSON OF THE CITIZENS ADVISORY COMMITTEE FOR FINANCE

A member of the committee reported on discussions at the September 21 meeting covering the facilities projects currently under consideration. These projects address age of facilities and findings of the district's building condition survey and include a proposed Energy Performance Contract, reconfiguration and renovation of the high school bus loop and parking lot, security vestibules, air conditioning options, the master athletics plan for the high school and South Woods Middle School campus and other upgrades. Costs associated with these projects, as well as the proceeds from the sale of a 2.4-acre parcel in Woodbury near the Walt Whitman Elementary School, were also discussed.

Speakers cited the importance of each holiday in their respective culture and religion and referenced holidays of other faiths that are traditionally observed on the calendar. Several Board members acknowledged the importance of being inclusive to all cultures and faiths. After listening to all of the comments, the Board unanimously approved Diwali, Eid-al-Fitr and Eid-al-Adha as holidays to be scheduled in the 2017-18 school year.

BOARD OF EDUCATION SUB-COMMITTEES

POLICY 2250

The Board of Education may, from time to time, establish sub-committees whose membership will consist of less than a quorum of members of the Board of Education. The president of the Board of Education and the Superintendent of Schools shall serve as an ex-officio members of all committees to which they are not appointed. The duties of Board of Education committees shall be outlined at the time of appointment. Board of Education committees shall undertake studies and make reports as charged by the Board of Education, but shall not act on behalf of the Board of Education. The Board of Education may establish standing or ad hoc committees and reserves the right to terminate any committees at any time.

Any official policy-level action shall be in the sole discretion of the Board of Education. The Board of Education is in no way obligated to follow committee recommendations. The Board of Education has the right to accept, reject, or modify all or any part of a committee recommendation.

Cross-ref:

The School District shall provide a public education to all persons residing in the School District between the ages of five and twenty-one who have not received a high school diploma. No person shall be refused admission into or be excluded from the School District on account of any legally protected status as enumerated in policy 0100, Equal Opportunity, including race, creed, color, national origin, sex, gender (including gender identity and expression), sexual orientation, weight, religion, marital status, disability, or predisposing genetic characteristic.

A veteran of any age who has not yet received his/her high school diploma and who has been discharged under conditions other than dishonorable is eligible to attend school.

A non-veteran under twenty-one years of age who has received a high school diploma shall be permitted to attend school or BOCES upon payment of tuition.

Residency

Parents/guardians must provide sufficient proof that they reside in the School District when enrolling their children in School District schools. Examples of proof of residence include, but are not limited to:

- 1. A mortgage statement or deed of ownership;
- 2. A tax bill for the Town of Oyster Bay;
- 3. A copy of a lease executed by the tenant and landlord, with an affidavit by the landlord that the lease is in effect with a copy of the landlord's mortgage statement or deed of ownership;
- 4. Statements for utility bills;
- 5. A pay stub or income tax form showing the in-district address; or
- 6. A voter registration document or a state- or other government- issued ID.

Other Documentation

New entrants must also present the following documents:

- 1. <u>Proof of age</u> examples of acceptable forms of documentation include, but are not limited to, a birth certificate, baptismal record, or a passport (including a foreign passport);
- 2. <u>Proof of immunization</u> (see also policy and regulation 5420, Student Health Services) dates for immunization against diphtheria, polio, measles, German measles (rubella), mumps, pertussis, tetanus, pneumoccal disease, Haemophilus influenza type B, hepatitis B, meningococcal disease and varicella); and
- 3. A health certificate from a licensed physician.

Students transferring from another school district are asked to provide the transfer or discharge notice from former school district (except for kindergarten students). Students with disabilities are asked to provide the IEP from the former school district.

Family Homes

Children cared for in free family homes and family homes at board located within the School District, when such family homes are the actual and only residence of the children, and who are not supported or maintained by a social services district or a state department or agency, shall be deemed residents of the School District for purposes of attending School District schools without tuition.

Where a child is placed from outside of his school district of residence into the school district in family homes at board by a social services district or state agency, the Superintendent of Schools is authorized to recover, to the extent permitted by law, the cost of instruction of that student from the school district of residence.

Homeless Children

Homeless children between the ages of five and twenty-one, who have not received a high school diploma, shall be entitled to attend school within the School District in accordance with the provisions of law (See policy 5151, Homeless Children).

Placement

Any child reaching the age of five (5) on or before December 1 of any year will be eligible for kindergarten in the preceding September. Any child who meets these age requirements may be enrolled in kindergarten after the opening day of school. Any child enrolled in a kindergarten at another public, private or parochial school who does not meet these eligibility requirements will not be permitted to transfer into the School District during the year in which they are enrolled in kindergarten.

A child reaching the age of six (6) on or before December 1 of any year will be eligible for Grade 1 in the preceding September. A child who does not meet this age requirement, but who has satisfactorily completed a year's work in a kindergarten program approved by the New York State Education Department which provides substantially equivalent instruction to that of the local public school, may be enrolled in Grade 1 if requested by the parent/guardian.

A child entering this School District after the opening day of school who has been enrolled in Grade 1 or above in another school district will be placed in the same grade. If it is determined that the child is not properly placed, an alternate placement will be made.

SCHOOL ADMISSIONS

POLICY 5150

Fraud

If any information or document has been falsified in connection with registration and/or placement, the Superintendent of Schools shall assess the educational status of the child and shall notify the parent/guardian in writing of the rejection of said documentation on this basis. Upon finding an intentional fraud, the Superintendent of Schools shall recommend appropriate action to the Board of Education and notify the parent/guardian in writing of his/her recommendation and the Board of Education's decision concerning the provision of educational services to their child. To the extent the Superintendent of Schools deems it appropriate, he/she shall notify the proper authorities of the fraudulent act.

In the event the Board of Education or its designee has determined that proof of residency has not been established, the Board of Education, or its designee, shall provide the parent/guardian of such child with notification of such determination in accordance with the Education Law and the Commissioner of Education's regulations concerning the exclusion of a student on the basis of residency.

REPORTING OF HAZARDS

Policy 8111

The Board of Education recognizes its responsibility to provide an environment which is reasonably secure from known hazards. The Board of Education therefore directs the Superintendent of Schools and all staff members to comply with occupational safety and health regulations, including the Hazard Communication Standard and "Right to Know" legislation.

The Superintendent of Schools or his/her designee will direct appropriate personnel to develop and oversee a written hazard communication program. Such program will include the following:

- 1. the acquisition, maintenance and review of Material Safety Data Sheets (MSDS's) for all known hazardous materials on School District property;
- 2. the compilation of a hazardous materials inventory;
- 3. employee training in hazardous materials management and protection;
- 4. the recording of all incidents involving exposure to known hazardous materials. Records of employees who have been exposed to substances with enforceable exposure standards shall be kept for forty (40) years;
- 5. the publicizing of "how to report hazards and/or incidents" to school authorities; and
- 6. timely removal of hazardous materials from School District property when required.

The School District will comply with the requirements for the visual notification of pesticide spraying as set forth in the Environmental Conservation Law.

It is the responsibility of all employees, students and community residents to report to the building's main office any hazardous condition(s), material, equipment or incident which poses a threat to the health and safety of persons on school property.

Designated administrators will provide notice of hazardous materials to current and former employees within seventy-two (72) hours of a request.

EMERGENCY CLOSINGS

Policy 8134

The Superintendent of Schools or his/her designee (in the Superintendent of Schools' absence) may close the schools in the School District or dismiss early when hazardous weather or other emergencies threaten the health or safety of students and personnel.

In making the decision to close schools, the Superintendent of Schools or his/her designee will consider many factors, including the following principal ones that relate to the safety and health of children:

- 1. weather conditions, both existing and predicted;
- 2. driving, traffic, and parking conditions affecting public and private transportation facilities;
- 3. actual occurrence or imminent possibility of any emergency condition that would make the operation of schools difficult or dangerous; and
- 4. inability of teaching personnel to report for duty, which might result in inadequate supervision of students.

Students, parents, and staff will be informed early in each school year of the procedures that will be used to notify them in case of emergency closing. When schools are closed for emergency reasons, staff members will follow contractual obligations in reporting for work.

STUDENT TRANSPORTATION SERVICES

Policy 8410

Student transportation in the School District will be provided in accordance with applicable law and regulations. The following objectives will serve as a guide to School District personnel in connection with the implementation of the School District's student transportation program:

- 1. to furnish transportation to those students eligible for transportation pursuant to law;
- 2. to provide safe transportation;
- 3. to operate the transportation program efficiently and economically;
- 4. to adapt transportation to the requirements of the instructional program;
- 5. to maintain conditions on the buses that are conducive to the best interest of the students-including mental, moral and physical considerations;
- 6. to promote a sympathetic public understanding of the entire transportation program-including safety, adequacy, efficiency, and standards of service;
- 7. to establish and review at least once a year the school bus scheduling and routing plans; and
- 8. to establish and review at least once a year the eligibility for transportation of students residing in the School District.

Transportation shall be provided at School District expense to those students eligible under law and pursuant to mileage limitations authorized by the voters of the School District. In accordance with the voters' approval of a referendum on May 19, 1998, transportation is provided to students in grades K-12 who reside between zero (0) and fifteen (15) miles from the school they legally attend within the District. Students attending private or parochial schools may be transported up to a maximum of fifteen (15) miles from their home to school. Distance for transportation eligibility shall be measured from the nearest point where the property of the pupil's legal residence abuts the public street, via the shortest route over public roads and/or public walkways, to the nearest entrance to the grounds of the school to be attended.

The Board of Education shall have the sole discretion in designating pick-up points and to add or remove bus stops in order to provide reasonably safe and economical transportation for the students of the School District.

The Superintendent of Schools or his/her designee is responsible for administering the transportation program in accordance with the above-stated objectives.

USE OF DISTRICT-OWNED VEHICLES

Policy 8421

The nature of the work of the Director of Facilities requires a great deal of travel within the School District, therefore, use of a School District-owned vehicle is authorized by the Board of Education. The Director of Facilities may use such vehicles for any School District related activity or any emergency related to buildings and grounds.

Personal use of School District-owned vehicles for any other purpose than those outlined above is prohibited. Any traffic violation incurred through the use of a School District provided vehicle is the responsibility of the person incurring such violation.

CHARGING SCHOOL MEALS

Policy 8505

The Board of Education recognizes that on occasion, students may forget to bring meal money to school. To ensure that students do not go hungry, but also to promote responsible student behavior and minimize the fiscal burden to the School District, the Board of Education will allow students who may forget meal money to "charge" the cost of meals to be paid back at a later date subject to the terms in this policy.

To comply with State guidelines and to maintain a system for accounting for charged meals, regarding both full and reduced-price meals, the Board of Education shall:

- 1. allow only regular meals, defined as items on the menu, excluding extras and snacks, to be charged;
- 2. limit the number of charges to five (5) per student per school year;
- 3. when a student exceeds the charge limit, provide a milk and grain component at breakfast, and provide a sandwich, fruit and milk at lunch;
- 4. notify parents on a timely basis of outstanding charges; and
- 5. use a computer-generated point of sale system, which identifies and records all meals as well as collects repayments.

Charged meals must be counted and claimed for reimbursement on the day that the student charged (received) the meal, not the day the charge is paid back. If the School District suspects that a student may be abusing this policy, written notice will be provided to the parent that if he/she continues to abuse this policy, the privilege of charging meals will be refused. Families may apply for free-reduced price meals at any time during the school year. Applications are mailed to all families prior to the start of the school year. In addition, applications are available at the School District's Administrative Offices.

The School District shall send a letter home to all parents on an annual basis prior to the opening day of school, outlining the requirements of this policy. The policy shall also be published in appropriate school and School District publications.

Staff

Staff members are allowed to purchase food from the School District's food services. However, all purchases must be on a cash basis. Staff members will not be allowed to charge meals to be repaid later.

Consistent with the federal Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA) of 1993 as amended, the Board of Education recognizes the right of eligible employees to unpaid family and medical leave for up to twelve (12) workweeks during any twelve (12) month period. For the purposes of family and medical leave, the twelve month period necessary for eligibility shall be a rolling year. A rolling twelve (12) month period is measured backward from the date an employee uses any FMLA leave. The Board of Education shall ensure that all eligible employees who use such leave shall have their health benefits continued, shall not have any previously accrued benefits altered and except as otherwise authorized by law and shall be returned to his/her previous position or to an equivalent position according to established Board of Education practices, policies and collective bargaining agreements.

To be eligible for family or medical leave, an employee must have been employed for at least twelve months and have worked at least 1,250 hours during the prior twelve months.

Family leave shall be provided when a son or daughter is born to the employee or one is placed with the employee for adoption or foster care. Medical leave shall be provided in order for the employee to take care of a spouse, child or parent who has a serious health condition or when the employee has a serious health condition rendering him/her unable to perform the functions of the employee's job.

The term "serious health condition" means an illness, injury, impairment or physical or mental condition that involves: (a) inpatient care in a hospital, hospice, or residential medical care facility; or (b) continuing treatment by a health care provider.

Family leave shall be provided because of a qualifying exigency arising out of the fact that the employee's spouse, son, daughter, or parent is a member of the military on covered active duty status (or has been notified of an impending call or order to covered active duty) in the Armed Forces.

An eligible employee who is the spouse, son, daughter, parent, or next of kin of a covered service member is entitled to a total of twenty-six (26) workweeks of unpaid leave in a single twelve (12) month period to care for the service member who is seriously ill or injured in the line of duty.

The term "Parent" means a biological, adoptive, step or foster father or mother, or any other individual who stood in *loco parentis* to the employee when the employee was a child. This term does not include parents-in-law.

The term "Spouse" means a husband or wife as defined or recognized under state law for purposes of marriage in the state where the employee resides, including "common law" marriage and same-sex marriage. This term does not include a domestic partner.

The term "Child" means a biological, adopted, or foster child, stepchild, legal ward, or child of person standing in *loco parentis*, who is either under age eighteen (18), or age eighteen

(18) or older and "incapable of self-care because of a mental or physical disability" at the time family or medical leave is to commence.

A person stands in *loco parentis* if that person provides day-to-day care or financial support for a child. Employees with no biological or legal relationship to a child can stand in *loco parentis* to that child, and are entitled to family or medical leave pursuant to the Family Medical Leave Act.

An employee may elect, or the School District may require, an employee to use accrued paid vacation, personal or family leave for purposes of a family or medical leave.

The employee shall notify the School District of his/her request for leave, if foreseeable, at least thirty (30) days prior to the date when the leave is to begin. If such leave is not foreseeable then the employee shall give such notice as is practical. The School District may require a certification from a health care provider if medical leave is requested. When an employee returns following a leave, he/she must be returned to the same or equivalent position of employment.

The Board of Education shall ensure that family and/or medical leave required pursuant to the Family Medical Leave Act is provided to all eligible employees, unless they are covered by a collective bargaining agreement which provides greater leave benefits than this Act.

The School District shall post a notice prepared or approved by the Secretary of Labor stating the pertinent provisions of the Family and Medical Leave Act, including information concerning enforcement of the law.
